### Congregations Singing Too Fast—Anders

A Lutheran musicologist has harsh words for the way music is being sung and played in some churches.

"There is a shocking lack of understanding of the musical style of the service, of proper musical interpretation, tempos and so on," the Rev. Charles R. Anders of New York told a Lutheran conference in Denver, Colo, recently.

"The tendency in many congregations is to sing the liturgy too fast," he said. "The bugbear used to be dragitis. Now it's speedomania.

Even the quiet, restrained plainsong or chant at one point in the Lutheran service he said, is often "rendered in the style of John Philip Sousa."

#### PROGRAM

#### NIKOLAUS BRUHNS (1665-1697)

Prelude and Fugue in e minor

Dictrich Buxtchude and Nikolaus Bruhns, the teacher and his student, were the most important representatives of the so-called North German Organ School, Nikolaus Bruhns stems from an old race of musicians in Schleswig-Holstein, Born in 1665, he became the favorite pupil of Dictrich Buxtchude. He became famous as an organ virtuoso, was active for a long time in Copenhagen, and was finally the organist at the Cathedral in Husum. He died at the age of 31. The Prelude and Fugue in e minor is one of his magnificent works full of musicianship and virtuosity.

#### DIETRICH BUXTEHUDE (1637-1707)

Fantasia on the Choral

Wie schoen leuchtet der Morgenstern

Buxtchude, the founder of the great German Organ school, was born in Denmark in 1637. In 1657 he was appointed organist at the Marienkirche in Lubeck. We remember him especially for his famous "Abendmusik" (evening concerts) which he instigated, and which are for us a prototype for Church practice today. His works for the organ include the Chorale Preludes and above all the Chorale Phantasies. In "Wie schoen leuchtet der Morgenstern" (How lovely shines the morning star), the cantus firmus appears twice — first, in a colorful fantasia in which the c. f. appears clearly, and then in a fugal form.

#### JAN PIETER SPEELINCK (1562-1621)

Fantasia chromatica

Sweelinck was born in Deventer in 1562, and, when he died in 1621, he was organist at the famous "Oude Kerk" in Amsterdam. Sweelinck, who studied with Zarlino in France, became the most sought after teacher of his time. His significant contribution to the history of music is the organ Fugue, which he built on simple themes with contrasting coloration. J. S. Bach was the first to bring this form, developed by Sweelinck, to its fullest potential.

#### IOHANN NEPOMUK DAVID (1895)

Toccata and Fugue in f minor

Johann Nepomuk David, an Austrian by birth, came to Leipzig in 1934 to work together with Karl Straube and the St. Thomas Choir. He now lives in Stuttgart and holds a position at the State Music Conservatory. His works extend into nearly every area of sacred and secular music. He is considered to be one of the more significant contrapuntalists of our time. The Toccata and Fugue in f minor, composed in 1928, reflects in influence of Reger and Bruckner; it is nevertheless rich in virtuous compactness and temperamental musicianship.

HUGO DISTLER (1908-1942)

Partita (Toccata, Bicinium, Fugue)

Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme

As a 26 year old organist on Lubeck's historic organ in St. Jacobi Kirche, Distier wrote this three-verse Partila "Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme" (Wake, awake, for night is flying). This work, which is one of the pioneering attempts of Distler, the founder of contemporary German organ music, has its roots in the old bareque and pre-baroque sound ideal whese forms he used to arrive at his new musical sound. The cantus firmus is set in the Pedal against contrasting runs in the manuals which are made up of numerous fourth and fifth intervals, in the Bicinium (two-voice setting) the c. f. is alternated from one voice to the other, while in the fugue, the fugal theme appears with the c. f. from which it is derived.

#### IOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH (1685-1750)

Prelude and Fugue in e minor

When Bach was court musician in Weimar, he began the "Little Organ Book", which is a collection of short, but musically concentrated organ chorale settings. It is designed to give the beginning organist training in the various possibilities of setting the Cantus Firmus in a Chorale Prelude. The Prelude and Fugue in e minor belongs to the last large works of Bach's Leipzig Period. The Prelude and the Fugue complement one another in their great contrast. The Prelude is formal in character, adhering to a strict working of the thematic material. Contrasted to this is the Fugue in three sections which is free from a strict form. It presents a chromatically-developed theme which starts from the tonic tone "e" and expands chromaticaly in both directions.

Arno Schoenstedt was born 1913 in the small Thuringian town of Sondershausen. He completed his schooling in 1932 and between 1934 and 1937 pursued his muscial studies with such great figures as Guenther Ramin, Johann Nepomuk David and Karl Straube in Leipzig and Fritz Heitmann in Berlin. In 1937 he became assistant organist at the famous old St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, where Bach was once organist, going in 1938 to St. Matthew's Church in the same city as cantor and organist. In 1945 he returned to St. Thomas as its regular organist, remaining there until 1947, when he left East Germany to accept positions in Herford in Westphalia as Cathedral organist and instructor at the Westphalian Church Music Institute, which positions he still holds.

Mr. Schoenstedt is widely known throughout Europe as an organ consultant and recitalist, having concertized extensively in Germany, England, Switzerland, Holland, Belgium, Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland, as well as also making radio broadcasts in several of these countries. In 1961 he made his first trip to the United States as organist, for a distinguished choral group, the Westphalian Kantorei. Many Americans are already familiar with his organ-playing through his recordings of the music of Scheidt, Sweelinck, Buxtehude and Distler on the Cantate label.

Mr. Schoenstedt was organist at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, East Germany, where Bach was once organist, until 1947. Since then he has been at a West German cathedral and an instructor at a church music institute.

At its three services the same day, the congregation will hear the Rev. Paul L. Maier, son of the late Rev. Walter A. Maier, International Lutheran Hour founder.

ARTICLE VI (Continued)

Chapter of A. G. O. The officers of Omaha Chapter shall be: Doan, Sub-Dean, Secretary-Treasurer, Registrar, three elected members-at-large, and appointed officers as stipulated in Article III of these By-Laws.)

- a) DEAN The Dean (and in his absence the Sub-Dean) shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Committee and at all General Meetings of the Chapter. He shall be a member ex-officio of all special and standing committees of the Chapter. He shall have power to fill all vacancies in all committees of the Chapter. The programs of the Chapter shall be the responsibility of the Dean and the Executive Committee, and this responsibility shall include recitals, workshops, festivals, etc.
- b) SUB-DEAN In addition to his usual duties of assisting the Dean in the promotion of all Chapter activities, the Sub-Dean shall be in charge of membership recruitment.
- o) SECRETARY-TREASURER The Secretary-Treasurer shall be in charge of all Chapter records relating to membership and finance. He shall send membership cards to members in good standing. He shall propare a monthly report of receipts, disbursements, and the current financial status of the Chapter, which shall be included in the Windchest, and he shall also prepare an annual summary of the financial status of the Chapter to be presented at the Annual Meeting in May.
- d) REGISTRAR The Registrar shall keep a careful record of the proceedings at all meetings of the Chapter and of the Executive Committee and shall handlo correspondence not otherwise deligated to the Secretary-Treasurer.
- e) APPOINTIVE OFFICERS (Members in good standing who shall be appointed by the Dean and shall be members of the Executive Committee.)
  - 1. SOCIAL CHAIRMAN
  - 2. PUBLICITY CHAIRMAN 3. CHAIRMAN OF THE CALLING COMMITTEE

#### 4. COURTESY CHAIRMAN

### 321 Supplementary By-Laws

#### SUPPLEMENTARY BY-LAWS GOVERNING THE OPERATION OF OMAHA CHAPTER, AMERICAN GUILD OF ORGANISTS

- ARTICLE I MEMBERSHIP -- There shall be created forthwith in Omaha Chapter a classification of membership to be known as "Members Emeritus of Omaha Chapter, American Guild of Organists". A member may be so designated by a majority vote of
  the Executive Committee of Omaha Chapter in recognition of long and/or distinguished service to the Chapter, or other moritorious service in the judgement of the Executive Committee, and, upon bestowal of this designation, all future dues (including all obligations of such member to the National Headquarters and his subscription The Diapason magazine) shall be borne by Omaha Chapter so long as he shall remain within the jurisdiction of this chapter.
- ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP -- The Executive Committee of Omaha Chapter shall have the authority to reject the application of any person for membership in the Guild and to return any accompanying fees and dues when there is known to be good and sufficient evidence of undecirable character, morals, or an attitude on the part of the applicant which is contrary to the best interests of the Guild. Such rejection shall be by majority vote of the Executive Committee at a regular or special meeting with a quorum of the members present.
- ARTICLE III EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE -- It is hereby provided that members in good standing in Omaha Chapter may be appointed to the Executive Committee to form a part of it and assist in conducting Chapter business. These members shall be known as members-at-large, and their terms of office shall edincide with those of the elected officers. At no time shall the number of such appointed members exceed that of the ELECTED members-at- large (as provided by the National Constitution). The immediate Past Dean shall be automatically a member of the Excoutive Committee.
- ARTICLE IV BALLOTING AND ELECTIONS -- In order that the program of Omaha Chapter, A. G. O., may be more efficiently conducted, provision is hereby made that certain substitute dates be recognized and accepted for those contained in the National Constitution of the A. G. O., Article III, Sections 4g and 4h, dealing with the appointment of the nominating committee, balloting and election. These substitutions are as follows:
  - 1. In Section 4g: The date of appointment of the nominating committee is to be
  - changed from December to February.

    2. In Section 4g: An additional provision is hereby made that notice of the election is to be published in the March "Windohest"; also, that the names of the nominating committee be contained therein, and that the deadline for additional nominations, as specified in the National Constitution, be changed from April ist to May 1st.

    5. In Section 4b: The data of the report of the nominating committee to the experience.
  - 3. In Section 4h: The date of the report of the nominating committee to the ex-
  - ecutive committee is to be changed from February to April.

    4. Under Section 4h: Frovision is hereby made for balloting by mail through a ballot, listing the names of all nominees, to be published in the May "Wind-

- ARTICLE V DUES -- Through action taken by Omaha Chapter in a regular meeting on June 12th, 1961, the Treasurer is honceforth empowered to make the following immediate refunds upon payment of Dues and Fees as stipulated by National Headquarters;
  - 1. \$5.00 of each yearly payment of Duese 2. \$1.00 of each Initiation Fee.

  - 3. \$1.00 of each Reinstatement Fee.
  - \$.30 for each month of Dues paid, pro-rated by National Headquarters at \$1.00 per month.

### Theater Organ Fans 'Organize

Having previously mentioned cycles, vogues and fads in music, let me suggest a further report of what has been going on in this respect in the pipe organ world.

First, one must know that he can not say, "A pipe organ is an organ, is an organ, is an organ." For matters such as design necessitate various adiectives. Thus, in over-simplification, we have romantic organs, classical and baroque organs and theater organs.

It is of theater organs that I now speak.

It all got started with the advent of the old silent movies. That was when some aggressive person in the entertainment world hit upon the idea of installing a pipe organ to satisfy his dissatisfaction with tin-pan pianos and their players.

Some of the many features distinguishing them from church organs were incorporation of such gadgets as bells, whistles, harps, pianos, snare drums, percussional traps and ev-

erv imaginable sound effect.

Many consoles were mounted on elevators so that they could be dramatically brought into view to spotlight the performer and his console as he rendered his inevitable solo num-

This era brought forth some amazingly clever players of theater instruments. They had to be of such musical resourcefulness as to be able to improvise, modulate quickly and have at their fingertips snatches or entire themes from the standard literature.

They had to have the versatility to catch and communicate action and moods of the picture with true cinematic fluency. Many a musician found exciting fascination in listening to their expertness.

Church organists, however, looked with disdain on what they considered the illegitimate offspring of their church instruments. Then, with advent of "talkies," the theater or-gan began to fade.

Now, to the point: With many of those theater organs having been rescued from warehouses and razed

theaters, the old movie organ is back. The news comes to us via a National Observer feature story. It tells of a group of buffs still cherishing the memory of those early days by organizing themselves into the American Theater Organ Enthusiasts.

The Enthusiasts are eight years old, have chapters in 27 cities with about" two thousand family memberships. Many of them reinstall organs in their homes and make a hobby of playing or tinkering with

Others re-install them in places like warehouses with sufficient space to put on concerts.





TOCCATA AND FUGUE IN D MINOR Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Bach composed this work, as he did many of the Preludes and Fugues, while Court organist at Weimar (1708-1717). The dramatic Toccata with its daring passage work, and the flowing motion of the Fugue, dissolving into rhapsodic passages, result in a work of great virtuosity.

Herzlich thut mich verlangen Johann Sebastian Bach Herzlich thut mich verlangen Johannes Brahms (1835-1897) The so-called "Passion Chorale", familiar to all as "O Sacred Head Now Wounded", was based on a love song which, in its first sacred setting, was to the words "Herzlich thut mich verlangen" (My heart is filled with longing). This chorale was a great favorite of Bach and there is no other he used so frequently. Bach has ornamented this beautiful melody and placed it in the upper voice of his Chorale Prelude, while Brahms uses the melody in the pedal beneath a flowing accompaniment on the manuals. The Eleven Chorale Preludes, Opus 122, were the last compositions of Brahms. They constitute a discerning document of Brahms' life, and, as both a restrospect and an epilogue, deal primarily with "last things." My heart is filled with longing shares with the other preludes the somber, yet warm autumnal quality that is all Brahms' own.

- FANFARE IN C MAJOR Henry Purcell (1658-1695)
  A keyboard flourish by the most famous of early English composers.
  Purcell was appointed Organist at Westminster Abbey in 1680.
- CHORAL IN A MINOR

  Céscir Franck (1822-1890)

  The Three Chorals, written in 1890 just before Franck's death, were the last compositions of this great 19th century French Romanticist. The third Choral in A Minor holds perhaps the most immediate appeal, opening with a toccata-like flourish of a broken-chord motif. Following several sustained arpeggios this motif alternates with phrases of the chorale. One of Franck's most lyric and rhapsodic melodies forms the basis of the middle section. Fragments of this are heard repeated as the music crescendos through a statement of the chorale theme. The pedal point which grows out of the middle section is the foundation for a restatement of the opening broken-chord motif, then becoming an accompanimental figure for the chorale itself. The final climax is one of Franck's most

Myron Roberts is on the faculty of the University of Nebraska at

Prelude opens in a quiet improvisatory manner, followed by exhilarating flourishes.

CORTEGE ET LITANIE Marcel Dupre (b. 1886)

Marcel Dupre, one of the finest of French organists, has been heard in the United States many times and is noted for his ability at improvisation. The Cortege et Litanie was written for orchestra and organ solo. The Cortege, a quiet chordal movement, employs the romantic voices of the organ. The Litanie begins with an ostinato figure which persists throughout the movement, gaining in power until it sweeps all voices together with the theme of the Cortege to the final climax.

Dr. Sowerby, formerly head of the Department of Composition at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago and Organist and Choirmaster at the Cathedral of St. James, is regarded throughout America as one of its finest contemporary composers. He is now on the faculty of the College of Church Musicians at the Washington Cathedral in Washington, D. C. This is one of his earlier compositions. His use of chimes and bell-like passages heightens the effectiveness of this exquisite work.

DORIAN PRELUDE ON "DIES IRAE" Bruce Simonds (b. 1895)

The Dies Irae is one of the most impressive products of medieval poetry and music. Probably written by Thomas a Celano (d. 1256), it is one of the five surviving sequences in the Roman Liturgy, being sung at Requiem Mass. Bruce Simonds, brilliant pianist and composer at Yale University, has made dramatic use of this ancient theme various colorful settings within the Prelude. Following it's first presentation in the powerful introduction, the "Dies Irae" motif is clearly set forth in its musical development, reaching a stirring climax in the toccata section with the theme majestically stated in the pedal.

The audience is invited to meet Miss Jensen at a reception in the Church parlors following the concert.





Craighead is in charge of the organ department at Eastman School of Music in Rochester and is organist at St. Paul's Episcopal Church there.

He will meet with organists from the Omaha - Council Bluffs area for a workshop at 8 p.m. Monday at the church, and will discuss and demonstrate effective church service playing.

#### PROGRAM

 JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH......Chorale Partita "O Gott, due frommer Gott" (1685-1750)

Bach's partita "O God, Thou faithful God" is an early set of chorale variations that shows clearly the influence of Bohm. The chorale itself introduces the work in a straightforward manner. This is followed by eight variations that equal the number of stanzas of the chorale, and that grow successively in warmth and complexity. It has been said that "the further we progress in this set of variations, the clearer Bach's own path is marked." The chorale tune will be found in the hymnal at number 86.

The importance of Bach hardly requires mention. In addition to an unparalleled technical perfection, his glorious works speak the language of God and Eternity, and the passing centuries find them to be an ever-growing monument of imperishable faith and beauty. The magnificent structure of the Passacaglia is well described by Manfred Bukofzer: "The twenty variations are organized in strictly symmetrical groups, each of which is unified by corresponding rhythmical patterns. The axis of symmetry is formed by the tenth and eleventh variations in which the bass theme is carried in double counterpoint to the highest voice. It then returns step by step to its original position. The cycle is crowned by a fugue."

The contract of much IV. CESAR FRANCK.......Prelude, Fugue, and Variation (Op. 18) (1822-1890)The great Belgian composer, Cesar Franck, spent most of his life in Paris. By many he is considered to be the founder of the modern French school of composition. In La Religion de la Musique (Paris, 1909), M. Camille Manclair says of Franck's music: "No one else has that faculty of suave and sensuous mysticism, that unique charm, that serene plentitude of fervor, that purity of soaring melody, above all that power of joy that springs from religious effusion, that radiant whiteness resulting from a harmony at once ingenuous and ecstatic." (1729 - 1783)Andantino Minuet This is the third of a set of six concertos for two organs by the early Spanish composer, Antonio Soler. Although written for two performers at separate instruments, the music lends itself well to solo performance. This arrangement is by E. Power Biggs, who together with Daniel Pinkham recently recorded all six concertos in their original form. VI. MAX REGER. Fantasie on the Chorale "How Brightly Shines the Morning Star" (1873-1916)(Op. 40, No. 1) Max Reger first came to the attention of the music world in 1901 after moving to Munich from his boyhood at Weiden. He has always been a highly controversial composer, regarded by some as the greatest contrapuntalist since Bach, but much less favorably by others. To this day there remains a veritable Reger-cult, concentrated chiefly in Germany and Austria, and there appears to be the return of a considerable amount of interest in his music in this country. In this Fantasie and Fugue the chorale emerges serenely from a sinister and chaotic introduction. Four stanzas of the hymn are treated as variations, the fifth appearing triumphantly in the closing section of the tremendous fugue. A Bach harmonization of this tune appears in the hymnal at number 145. The audience is invited to meet Mr. Craighead at a reception in the Church Parish Hall following the concert. 
