Jeff has our Website up and running, bringing about several updates and changes. Look for a new dean's article on the title page, a list of AGO and chapter goals based on the AGO Mission Statement, and visionary plans to implement stated short and long range goals.

Last summer, Jeff offered to enter the historic files, programs, and highlights of the 100 year history of Omaha AGO in computer files. Highlights of these historic files will appear on the Website, beginning immediately. The chapter was founded as the "Nebraska Chapter AGO" in 1917, renamed the "Omaha Chapter AGO" in the Mid-fifties. The very first program sponsored by the Nebraska Chapter was a choral program held at All Saints' Church on December 9, 1917. It featured the choirs of All Saints and First Presbyterian Churches. This program is an example of historic items that will appear on the Website.

"THE PART-TIME ORGANIST"

Plans are well underway for "The Part-Time Organist" workshop scheduled on Saturday, February 24 at Presbyterian Church of the Cross, 1517 South 114th Street, Omaha. The workshop runs from 9:00-12:00 noon, with registration beginning at 8:30.

Those attending are encouraged to park in the south parking lot, entering the church through the south door. Day-care for infants and young children will be available from 8:30-12:30 p.m. DAY-CARE RESERVATIONS, INCLUDING AGE, NEED TO BE MADE BY WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 21. Contact Dr. Christensen at: mrc@chase3000.com to reserve child-care privileges. The chapter is responsible for child-care fees.

Sessions include:

- Meaning of stop names, (principal, octave, etc.) four stop families, (Principal, Flute, String, Reed); and numbers on stops (8' 4' 2 2/3' etc.);
- Organ practice techniques; resources for organ students, including beginners; collaboration with other educational groups;
- Session on accompanying (leading) congregational singing; including introduction of hymns; simple verse variation; registration;
- Accessible music for organ; examples will be played, then passed around;
- Choral repertoire; directing.

Dietze Music House will bring a display of organ music for sale, implemented by Jill Anderson of the West Center Dietze store. Multiple titles introduced in the "Accessible music for organ" will be available for sale. Refreshments will be served during registration and two short breaks.

A specific challenge is reaching those part time organists who would benefit by attending this workshop. While the chapter is promoting this workshop through various denominations in Nebraska and Western Iowa, those communications often do not reach the parish musicians. So, a suggestion: personally invite one or more "Part-time Organists" to be our guests for this workshop. Offer a ride to and from the workshop, and maybe lunch in a local restaurant or café following the workshop!

Sinai Festival Sounds, concert series of Sinai Lutheran Church in Fremont, Nebraska, presents organist **Ann Marie Rigler** with violinist/violist **Eric Williams** on Sunday, February 18, at 3:00 pm. Their varied program will be based in part on Lenten themes and will include pieces that feature modern violin, Baroque violin, and viola, as well as Sinai's Juget-Sinclair organ.



Many Omaha and Lincoln AGO members will remember Rigler from past performances in the area (Sundays at Strauss and Lincoln Organ Showcase among other programs) and her time on the music faculty at Wayne State College. She is now Professor of Music and College Organist at William Jewell College in Liberty, Missouri, where she teaches courses in music history and Christian worship practices in addition to organ and piano lessons. She also serves as organist for weekly Chapel services, as pianist for the Chapel Choir, and as organist for Jewell's critically acclaimed Concert Choir, with whom she will return to the United Kingdom in May 2018 for her third tour as organ soloist and accompanist. Her performances with the choir on their 2015 release on the Centaur label, The Trumpet Sounds, earned her accolades from the American Record Guide as "a jewel of an organist." In the spring of 2017, she was honored to receive the William Jewell College Student Senate's Excellent Campus Citizen Award for her work as College Organist. As a member of Concert Artist Cooperative, she maintains an active schedule as solo recitalist, chamber musician, and presenter, including performances at national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Organ Historical Society, the College Music Society, and Musforum.

Eric T. Williams is a violinist and violist with an eclectic background. He holds Bachelor of Music Education and Bachelor of Music in Violin Pedagogy degrees from the University of New Mexico, and a Master of Music in Viola Performance from Yale University. Among the many ensembles he has performed with are the Santa Fe Opera, New Mexico Symphony Orchestra, Santa Fe Symphony, Lawrence Chamber Orchestra, Jackson Symphony, North Arkansas Symphony, Chamber Orchestra of Albuquerque, and the Four Corners Opera. He also performed in several cities in Germany and Hungary as a founding member of Camerata Lawrence. Williams served on the music faculties of the University of New Mexico and Murray State University and also taught orchestra in the Albuquerque Public Schools for five years. After obtaining his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Kansas School of Law, he was a solo practitioner in Kansas and Missouri for nearly 11 years. Williams is currently manager of grants for the Kansas City Symphony. A freelance musician, he performs at many musical events throughout the greater Kansas City area. He is especially devoted to Baroque music and is a founding member of the Kansas City Baroque Consortium.




Ancient Worship For the Modern Soul

Member Spotlight Dana Sloan



Dana Sloan moved to Omaha in 1974 to become the first, full-time Minister of Music of the Presbyterian Church of the Cross. He retired from this position in 2014 after a 40 year tenure, the longest serving staff member in history of the church. He recently retired as Artistic Director of Vesper Concerts but continues as organist of the church.

Mr. Sloan attended the University of North Carolina and holds degrees in music from The Ohio State University and the University of Illinois-Champaign/Urbana. Among his teachers were Wilbur Held, Gordon Wilson and Jerald Hamilton.

The music program at the church grew under his direction to include 2 adult choirs, a Youth choir, 2 children's choirs, 2 handbell choirs, quartets of both men's and women's singers and a large brass ensemble. These ensembles perform a wide variety of choral music in worship services on a regular basis. The larger of the 2 adult choirs sings at least twice a year with professional orchestral accompaniment. Other ensembles perform with instrumental accompaniment as the occasion demands.

The church is home to Vesper Concerts which he began in 1988 to celebrate the dedication of the church's McFarland-Beaudry organ, an instrument which was built originally by the Boston-area builder George Hutchings in 1895. This 2 manual, 31 stop, 39 rank tracker organ is unique to the Omaha area. In the 29 year history of the Vesper Concerts (originally the Organ Vesper Series), a great variety of music has been performed by a large number of musicians, local, national and international. Several times the Series has been honored by mention in the Omaha World Herald as "Top 10" or "Honorable Mention Top 10" musical events of the season.

Mr. Sloan is active as a keyboard player and conductor. His repertoire of choral works and choral works with orchestra is extensive ranging from Bernstein's Chichester Psalms to Mozart's Requiem. In addition to his work in the weekly service playing, Dana has a wide repertoire of solo and ensemble music for organ, harpsichord and piano.

He would count among highlights of his career, performing as a harpsichord and organ soloist and ensemble musician with the Omaha Symphony and Omaha Symphony Chamber Orchestra. His travels have taken him across America and Europe. He would count among highlight during these travels playing exerpts of Widor's 5th Symphony (no, not the Toccata) at the church of St. Sulpice, playing Couperin at St. Gervais and Durufle and Poulenc at the Church of St. Etienne du Mont, all in Paris. He also played Handel at the church of St. Bavo in Haarlem, Holland. In this country, while on sabbatical, he had the opportunity to play many famous instruments in New York City, most notably at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

Dana is the father of two adult children, Ryan, an intensive care nurse in an Indianapolis hospital and Ashley, a special education teacher in Papillion. His two granddaughters live in Papillion.
