The Omaha area is truly enriched by the quality of many of the instruments in our places of worship. Of course, we immediately think of the Pasi at St. Cecilia and the Casavant at St. Wenceslaus. But there are many more, and the congregations that maintain and use these instruments are to be commended. To mention a few, I recently subbed and played two fabulous instruments: the gorgeous four-manual at Dundee Presbyterian and the beautifully refined three manual at Kountze Memorial Lutheran. There is also a tonally rich organ at Pacific Hills Lutheran, and if my memory is correct, Dr. Charles Ore from Seward was instrumental in its design. Countryside Community has a fine new organ, which is awaiting generous donors to complete its Choir Division. I am sure all of you could add to this list.

A number of you have asked me if I know what is happening with the organ at the now closed Westminster Presbyterian. There is good news. It is being repurposed and will be installed in the music room at Joslyn Castle. It is always good when pipes are salvaged.

One concern, of course, for all of us is the servicing of our organs. We are blessed to have several fine technicians in the area, and they are certainly in high demand. And, of course, Bedient Organ is down the road in Lincoln. For digital organs, Richard Walker from Keyboard Kastle shared with me as he was repairing my home organ that he is pretty much the main and only service technician for Allen (and others) in the Midwest. He is concerned what will happen when he retires some day. Hello, young people. Not only is there a need for young organists, but there is a need for organ technicians, both pipe and digital. By the way, the guts of my digital look more like a computer than a musical instrument, and we had to send the CPU all the way to the east coast to get repaired.

Not only do we have a rich variety of good organs in the metro, we have an amazing list of programs and concerts. It was wonderful to see so many of our chapter members at the Peter Sykes recital Sunday and about 20 of us at his master class on Monday evening. But there is a lot more coming up. A door offering for our chapter Scholarship Fund will be received.


